





2025 4-H Essay Contest

The Importance of Youth in Beekeeping: How 4-H Members Can Make a Difference!

For this essay, a 4-H student should answer these questions: Why youth is important in beekeeping? How can 4-H members make a difference? How can more young people involved in beekeeping? What are your future plans as a beekeeper? What is a major contribution a young beekeeper has brought to the industry?

Eligibility: The 2025 National 4-H Beekeeping Essay Competition is open to active 4-H Club members only. Any 4-H Club member who placed first, second or third in previous years of the national competition is NOT eligible to win in 2025; however, state competition winners remain eligible to enter the national competition. Essays entered must encompass the designated topic only. There will be no exceptions.

Competition Rules & Essay Requirements: Any 4-H Club member interested in writing an essay should contact their local 4-H office for competition details. The state selection process must be completed through the 4-H system.

Failure to meet any one of the essay requirements will result in disqualification.

Essay Requirements for National Judging: Essays must be typewritten or computer-generated on singlesided pages and formatted following standard manuscript format using double-spaced type and 12pt font in a legible font face.

Essays must encompass the designated topic in 750 to 1,000 words. Word count does not include sources, works cited, or the writer's biographical statement.

All factual statements and interview references must be cited in a "sources" or "bibliography."

Essays will be judged on (a) scope of research, 40%; (b) accuracy, 30%; (c) creativity, 10%; (d) conciseness, 10%; and (e) logical development of the topic, 10%.

On a separate page, please include a brief biographical statement of the writer including mailing address, email address, and phone number.

The deadline for national submission to the NM State 4-H Office is April 25, 2025. Please email submissions to: samlowry@nmsu.edu

Each state may submit only ONE entry. Decisions made by the trustees of the Foundation for the Preservation of Honey Bees during national judging are final. All national competition entries become the property of the foundation and may be used as it sees fit. No essays will be returned.

Awards: Three cash prizes will be awarded in the 2025 National 4-H Beekeeping Essay Competition. The author of the highest-scoring essay will win first prize. The author of the second-highest scoring essay will win second prize. The author of the third-highest scoring essay will win third prize.

First Prize: \$750 **Second Prize:** \$500 **Third Prize:** \$250 The three prize-winning essays will be published in ABF Quarterly, the magazine of the American Beekeeping Federation. All authors of essays submitted to the national competition will receive a relevant book on honey bees, beekeeping, or honey

For full consideration, entries must be emailed to samlowry@nmsu.edu no later than April 25th.

Only one entry from New Mexico will be entered in the National contest.





District Contest is for Novice and Junior 4-H members who qualified at County Contest. Parents are responsible for lodging.





QUISHING

Quishing, short for QR code phishing, is a type of cybercrime where scammers use QR codes to redirect users to malicious websites or applications, often disguised as legitimate offers or requests.

Examples:

Fake invoices: Scammers send emails with QR codes that redirect users to take payment pages to steal their financial information.

<u>QR code login</u>: Some apps and software offer QR code logins, which can be exploited for scammers to gain access to user accounts. <u>Promotional offers</u>: QR codes on flyers or posters can lead to fake websites offering enticing deals or giveaways, designed to trick users into providing personal information.

<u>Corporate HR Scam</u>: Employees receive an email appearing to be from their work, HR, with a QR code linked to a "mandatory survey," which is actually a phishing site designed to steal credentials.



Leaving Digital Footprints

Every time we are on the internet, we leave a trail of information behind us known as "digital footprints". These trails can be used to obtain personal information including demographics, religion, political affiliations, shopping interests, or more damaging purposes such as hacking into online accounts and accessing passwords.

As parents, guardians, 4-H agents, volunteer leaders, and young adult youth, t is important to understand what digital footprints are and educate youth and adults alike to recognize risks and consider if a post, share, like or search will represent them positively or negatively.

So, what is a digital footprint?

Digital footprints are data or information left behind while online. Digital footprints come in two types, passive and active. Passive footprints are made when information is collected without your knowledge. Examples include likes, shares or comments on social media posts and search history. This Information can be collected and used for targeted advertisements or social media group suggestions. Active digital footprints are created when sharing or providing personal information on social media or websites. Examples include photo and video uploads, posts, and blogs on public pages or sites.

It is important youth understand when something is posted online it is available to anyone to do with it what they want. Once posted, they are no longer in control of the information even with the best privacy settings. Posts allow others to save, copy, share, or comment, and can be used against them. Deleting a post, picture, or comment does not prevent the possibility of it ending up on a server somewhere. Once on the Web there is a strong chance it will be there forever. Practice and Teach:

I notify an adult if you read or see anything making you uncomfortable, worried, or upset Share and Use These Tips for Managing Digital Footprints

1. Search yourself online: search your name and see what shows up. If you find something you dislike, try to remove it. Google Help Center provides tips on how to remove personal information from Google.

2. Manage privacy settings: know what information is being shared on websites and social media. Manage privacy settings so you control, as much as possible, including who and where posts are shared. Be mindful, digital footprints are also af-

fected by your friend's content and settings.

3. Think, think, and think again before posting: before posting anything, be sure you are comfortable with everyone seeing it. Consider how you would feel if someone posted something similar about you. Remember, everyone reads, sees, and interprets things differently.

4. Deactivate and/or delete: when no longer using a social media profile or website, take time to deactivate and/or delete your account. In doing so, your content is no longer live and should not be searchable online. This removes the risk of accounts being hacked without your knowledge.

5. Create a positive footprint: plenty of examples exist of negative footprints left behind online. Creating a positive footprint is the best defense in protecting online reputations. Think through what is appropriate to share and what is important to keep private.

Create an awe-inspiring footprint

Hopefully you have a better understanding of digital footprints and take the appropriate steps in teaching youth to build strong, positive representations of their true self. The digital world is here to stay. If youth decide to participate or continue participating in online activities, have them think of footprint development as a lifelong process. The strongest trees are those that invest time building a strong root system and grow slowly. Encourage youth to take advantage of that time to decide how to use the digital platform to present themselves in a positive light and represent their best gualities. Scholarship Information

A Scholarship fund has been established by the 4-H County Council to provide financial assistance to 4-H members that wish to attend State, District, or County 4-H events. Scholarship will cover 50% of the registration expenses for Senior Leadership Retreat, Youth-Get-Away, Livestock School, Horse School, FCS School, 4-H Dog School, or \$250 of the team fees for serving as a State 4-H Officer, Ambassador, or a Diplomat. The scholarship will cover 100% of the registration expenses for 4-H County Camp.

The funding may not be used to attend State 4-H Conference, State 4-H Shooting Sports Contest, nor District Contest.

Scholarship Criteria—Available to any Novice, Junior or Senior 4-H Member.

State 4-H Office Community Service & Scholarship Information

If a youth is interested in attending one of the annual events and are looking for a way to assist with registration costs they can apply for the New Mexico 4-H Community Service Scholarship. The scholarship will cover the registration expenses for Senior Leadership Retreat, Youth Get-Away, Livestock School, Horse School, State 4-H Conference, 4-H International Exchange, FCS School, 4-H Dog School or \$250 of the team fees for serving as a State 4-H Officer or Ambassador.

The applicant can create their own community service or if they would like to work with an organization in creating a new program that is acceptable. The project must be an activity that the youth designs, organizes and implements that will have an impact on the community. <u>Scholarship Applications for the events are due two months before the event registration</u> <u>deadline</u>. <u>Forms must be filled out online when submitting applications</u>. The application is approved or declined by a committee. If declined, the applicant will be asked to provide further information on the proposal.

If the applicant submitted a scholarship application for an event and received the scholarship, they need to have their community service report complete and submitted to the State 4-H Office before they can apply for the community service scholarship for any future events.
